1 Introduction

1.1 Project Overview

Vopak Development Canada Inc. (Vopak), a wholly-owned subsidiary of Royal Vopak, is investigating the opportunity to construct, own and operate a new bulk liquids tank storage facility in Prince Rupert, British Columbia (BC). The proposed project is called Vopak Pacific Canada (the Project).

The Project is proposed to be located on Ridley Island within the lands and waters under the jurisdiction of the Prince Rupert Port Authority (PRPA). At full build-out the facility will have a capacity of 90,000 cubic metres (m^3) of liquefied petroleum gas (LPG), 260,000 m³ of diesel and/or gasoline and 220,000 m³ of methanol. It will consist of the following major components:

- a bulk liquids tank storage facility;
- a jetty; and
- supporting infrastructure and facilities, including power supply and a wastewater treatment system.

The Project will store LPG, diesel and/or gasoline, and methanol on behalf of Vopak's customers. Products will be transported to the Project via the existing Canadian National Railway line. Products will be received and unloaded into the Project storage facilities. From the storage facilities the products will be loaded via pipeline along the Project's jetty to a berthed ship. The Project is expected to be constructed by 2022.

The bulk liquids tanks storage facility will be located on approximately 30 hectares of land leased from PRPA. Appendix 1 shows a project site map. The marine terminal will be located within a water lot allocated by PRPA for the Project. It is anticipated that vessel loading operations will occur approximately once every three days, which at full capacity results in approximately 150 vessels per year depending on customer demand. The operational lifespan of the Project is anticipated to be a minimum duration of 50 years. At the end of the Project's operational life, the Project will be decommissioned according to an approved decommissioning plan as per applicable regulations at the time.

1.2 About Vopak

Vopak is the world's leading independent tank storage provider. We operate a global network of terminals located at strategic locations along major trade routes. With a 400-year history and a strong focus on safety and sustainability, we ensure efficient, safe and clean storage and handling of bulk liquid products and gases for our customers. By doing so, we enable the delivery of products that are vital to our economy and daily lives.

Vopak is listed on the Euronext Amsterdam stock exchange and is headquartered in Rotterdam, the Netherlands. Including our joint ventures and associates, we employ an international workforce of over 5,500 people. Vopak operates 66 terminals in 25 countries with a combined storage capacity of 35.9 million m³. Vopak has a 30 percent interest in the Ridley Island Propane Export Terminal (RIPET), which is currently being constructed in Prince Rupert, BC. RIPET is the first propane export facility off the coast of Canada.

1.3 Purpose of this Document

The purpose of this Public Consultation Plan (the Consultation Plan) is to describe the approach, methods and activities Vopak is proposing to implement to share Project-related information and seek input from the public, including potentially impacted communities and stakeholders in the vicinity of the Project. A separate Indigenous Consultation Plan is being developed with input from potentially affected Indigenous Groups and regulatory authorities.

The Consultation Plan has been developed as part of Vopak's commitment to be a good neighbour to the communities within which we propose to develop projects and also to meet the requirements for consultation set out in the Section 11 Order, a procedural order issued by the BC Environmental Assessment Office (BC EAO) as per the *Public Consultation Policy Regulation*. The objective of the Consultation Plan is to provide local communities and stakeholders with meaningful opportunities to provide input on the Project. Vopak expects that consultation and engagement with the public and stakeholders will continue to evolve based on the input we receive as the Project proceeds through the regulatory process.

2 Framework for Public and Stakeholder Consultation

2.1 Vopak's Principles for Public and Stakeholder Consultation

Vopak believes that open, transparent and respectful dialogue with local communities and stakeholders is key. The public and stakeholder engagement activities for the Project are guided by the following Vopak values:

- **Care for safety, health & environment:** Care for safety, health and environment is the guiding principle in all decisions we make and all activities we carry out. Vopak will aim to understand local community values, including those that pertain to safety, health and the environment.
- **Integrity:** As a company we strive to develop and maintain long-lasting relationships with local communities and stakeholders that are based on mutual respect and understanding. We act with honesty and reliability to build the foundation for these relationships.
- **Team spirit:** Vopak will seek and consider input from local communities and stakeholders with respect to the Project, understanding that feedback we receive will improve the sustainability of our Project.
- **Commitment:** Vopak is committed to undertaking ongoing engagement with local communities and stakeholders and to provide timely and accurate information about the Project. We seek to deliver what we promise and stick to the decisions made.
- **Agility:** Vopak will work to understand and respond to input from local communities and stakeholders, including feedback on how input has been considered in the Project planning, including mitigation plans. We continuously strive to improve the quality of our work and are open to feedback and alternative ideas.

2.2 Regulatory Framework

The Project requires environmental effects determinations by federal authorities under Section 67 of the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012* (CEAA 2012), as well as an Environmental Assessment (EA) under the BC *Environmental Assessment Act* (BCEAA). The Project will undergo a coordinated environmental review process between the BC EAO and federal authorities. Vopak filed a Project Description with the provincial and federal government agencies on June 27, 2018.

The Project is expected to also require a *Navigation Protection Act* Approval from Transport Canada, a *Fisheries Act Authorization* from the Department of Fisheries and Oceans and a Disposal at Sea permit from Environment and Climate Change Canada.

The Consultation Plan has been developed to meet Vopak's current understanding of public consultation requirements of the EAO and federal agencies as part of the environmental review of the Project, as outlined in the *Draft PRPA and EAO Coordinated Vopak Project Review Process* (Appendix 2) and the BC EAO Section 11 Order. The Consultation Plan outlines Vopak's proposed consultation program to share information and consult the public on the environmental review of the Project.

2.3 Scope of Consultation

Vopak will consult with the public in accordance with the Section 11 Order and as required by federal authorities throughout the course of the environmental review process. The Section 11 Order includes the following requirements for Vopak:

- Provide a Public Consultation Plan to the BC EAO, which outlines how Vopak will undertake consultation with the public during the environmental assessment (EA);
- Provide public notice prior to the start of any formal public comment period or open house;
- Organize and attend open houses as required by the BC EAO;
- Respond to public comments received during a public comment period;
- Provide Public Consultation Reports; and
- Participate in additional public consultation activities as required by the BC EAO.

Vopak will aim to coordinate provincial and federal public consultation requirements throughout the environmental review process, as outlined in the *Draft PRPA and EAO Coordinated Vopak Project Review Process* (Appendix 2) or in updated workplans developed for the EA.

3 Public and Stakeholder Identification

Different groups may be impacted or may have an influence on the Project, including the general public, local governments, community organizations, environmental groups, first responders and others. The following sections identify potential stakeholders, including local governments and elected officials. Vopak expects that further stakeholders with an interest in the Project will be identified as part of consultation activities with stakeholders, the public and regulatory authorities.

3.1 Local Governments/Elected Officials

The Project is proposed to be located on Ridley Island in Prince Rupert, British Columbia. Based on the location of the Project, the following local governments and elected officials have been identified for consultation and engagement activities:

- The City of Prince Rupert
- The District of Port Edward
- The North Coast Regional District
- Member of the Legislative Assembly for the North Coast
- Member of the Legislative Assembly for Skeena
- Member of Parliament for the Skeena-Bulkley Valley

3.2 Other Stakeholder Groups

In addition to the above-mentioned local governments and elected officials, Vopak has identified the following stakeholder groups as having an interest in or being potentially affected by the Project:

- The general public
- Community organizations, including community service providers
- Economic development organizations, i.e. Chambers of Commerce
- Educational stakeholders, including colleges, skills training organizations and secondary schools
- Environmental stakeholders, including non-governmental organizations
- First responders, including fire, ambulance and police
- Local businesses
- Marine users and associated stakeholder groups

4 **Proposed Public Consultation Plan**

The following section outlines Vopak's proposed consultation approach and methodology. This proposed approach has been developed based on Vopak's guiding principles for consultation, as well as provincial and federal consultation requirements.

4.1 Staged Approach to Consultation

Vopak proposes a staged approach to consultation and engagement to share Project information and seek input on an ongoing basis as more information becomes available about the Project. The following stages are proposed based on Project development stages and the regulatory process:

- **Initial Engagement**: this stage covers the time period from the Project inception to the filing of the Project Description;
- **Project Description and Terms of Reference/Pre-Application Phase Consultation:** this stage covers the time period from the filing of the Project Description, the issuance of the Section 11 Order, the development of the Terms of Reference/Application Information Requirements (TOR/AIR), the collection of baseline information and the filing of a draft Environmental Effects Evaluation (EEE)/Application for an Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) and any supporting permitting applications that may be submitted synchronously;
- Draft EEE/Application Review Phase Consultation: this stage covers the time period from the
 acceptance of the draft EEE by Federal Authorities/Application for an EAC by the EAO and any
 supporting permitting applications that may be submitted synchronously, to the receipt of the
 provincial Ministers' decision on the Application for the EAC and federal determination on the
 EEE; and
- **Ongoing Engagement:** this stage covers the time period from the receipt of the provincial Ministers' decision on the Application for the EAC and federal determination on the EEE, as well as any continuing synchronous permitting applications or any subsequent permitting applications, through construction, operations and decommissioning of the Project.

4.1.1 Initial Engagement

Vopak initiated early discussions with local governments and community stakeholders to introduce Vopak and the proposed Project and to learn about the local communities. The following table provides an overview of Vopak's initial engagement activities.

Initial issues raised included impacts of the Project on the quality of life in Port Edward due to noise, lighting, pollution, increased railway and marine traffic, as well as impacts on the marine environment. Other considerations included economic opportunities for the local communities.

4.1.2 Project Description and Terms of Reference/Pre-Application Phase Consultation

During this stage of consultation, Vopak proposes to engage with and seek input from the public, local community members and other stakeholders on the development of the draft TOR/AIR as set out in the Section 11 Order.

The specific objectives for this stage of consultation are to:

- Enable ongoing two-way communication and information sharing about the proposed Project and environmental assessment review to seek input on the development of the draft TOR/AIR;
- Support the EAO's Public Comment Period of at least 30 days to seek comments from the public on the draft TOR/AIR;
- Host open houses to provide the public with opportunities to review the Project Description and the draft TOR/AIR and to allow members of the public to ask questions and make comments;
- Incorporate relevant feedback into the draft TOR/AIR and provide details on how the feedback was considered in finalizing the TOR/AIR; and
- Document and report on additional concerns and comments regarding the Project and where, if applicable, these have been incorporated into the Project's design.

An overview of the proposed consultation activities to be undertaken in advance of filing the draft EEE/Application for an EAC is provided in Table 3 below.

4.1.3 Draft EEE/Application Review Phase Consultation

In this stage, the aim is to ensure the public and stakeholders have the opportunity to review and comment on the draft EEE/Application for an EAC. The specific objectives of this stage are to:

- Enable ongoing two-way communication and information sharing about the Project and environmental assessment review;
- Support the EAO's Public Comment Period of at least 30 days to seek comments from the public on the draft EEE/Application;
- Participate in open houses, as required by regulatory authorities, to provide the public with opportunities to review the draft EEE/Application and to allow members of the public to ask questions and make comments;
- Track and respond to comments, including how input has been considered in refining the Project design and developing avoidance and mitigation measures.

Vopak proposes the consultation activities as described in Table 4 to support the review of the draft EEE/Application for an EAC.


